MG (R) Nick Justice commanded U.S. Army Research, Development and Engineering Command (RDECOM) and Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland, from December 4, 2009, to February 10, 2012. Prior to commanding RDECOM, MG (R) Justice was the Program Executive Officer for the Program Executive Office Command, Control, and Communications - Tactical at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey.

With over 20 years in acquisition, MG (R) Justice served as Project Manager for the Transportation Coordinator's Automated Information for Movement Systems and Project Manager for Force XXI Battle Command Brigade and Below (PM FBCB2). As PM FBCB2, he fielded over 1,000 Blue Force Tracker systems to soldiers in Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom and transformed the force while in contact. Previous assignments included serving as the Sixth Allied Tactical Air Force as Chief of Project Management for Command and Control.

He earned a Bachelor's degree in History from the University of Maryland, a Master's degree in Institutional Management from Pepperdine University, and a Master's degree in International Relations from Salve Regina College.
